

Talks resumed in September with David Milner on Kettering's Missionary past, and in October with a talk from Steve Weston on Ancient Wind Instruments, with plenty of tuneful demonstrations!

Trustee Report for the year ended 31st December 2017

This represents the Friends of Kettering Museum and Art Gallery accounts for the period 1st January 2017 to 31st December 2017.

The accounts have been independently verified to confirm that proper records have been kept.

In 2017, considerable support has been given to the Museum and Gallery, and we have successfully fulfilled a number of important objectives from the Restricted Funds.

Trustees are elected annually from amongst the Members taking account of the various skills that are required to run the Charity. They ensure that the accounts are drawn up on an accruals basis consistent with the previous year, and accepted accounting standards. The Trustees have also considered the risks attaching to the Charity and believe that sufficient procedures are in place to mitigate those risks. General funds for running the society remain under pressure, however, and the recruitment of new members will be a key factor going forward to ensure the good financial health of the organization. We need more members and we are keen to welcome new volunteers.


The Trustees confirm that the Charity complies with section 4 of the Charities Act 2011 with regard to providing a public benefit.



In December, Karl Ruetter talked about the highs and lows of the life of a modern day composer, with examples of his work.

In January Rachel Aldridge showed us insights into her work in stained glass and in February Robert Kendall talked about Charles Rennie Macintosh.



The year ended in March, with a film about the impact of the arrival of American GIs in Kettering during WW II.

The Friends group has continued to support the Gallery and Museum. The 'pop-up' stalls in the town have proved very popular and have had a demonstrable positive effect on visitor numbers to the Gallery and Museum. Thanks are due to the volunteers who have helped to support these stalls, and also helped to run the various events at the museum and gallery. Fundraising continues to support children's' activities at the museum, purchase of exhibits and conservation work.


We have also supported the Gallery with prizes for the Youth Open competition, and joined in the celebration of the

Northamptonshire Heritage awards so deservedly presented to the gallery and museum in June.

This year saw two notable Alfred East events. The first was the publication of lan Luck's book 'Alfred East-The Incidental Etcher'. The second was the 3D scanning of the bust of Sir Alfred, which stands outside the gallery. This important task, which was backed by the Friends, has enabled a permanent record to be preserved, and a replica to be produced in the event of damage or theft of the original.

Our efforts this year have concentrated on promoting awareness of the gallery and museum and supporting the staff to offer as many activities as possible through the staff changes and other problems (water leak) that have taken place this year. We could not have done this were it not for the help given by our members and friends, and we hope that this will continue in 2018

Young Friends attending free sessions at the museum increased during 2017 and many comments have been received regarding the activities on offer. Members and the committee have stepped in to help with activities, support the staff at the museum and ensure the activities could take place safely. Both parents and volunteers gave very positive feedback and found it both rewarding and exhausting.

The 9 monthly talks this year have attracted twice as many visitors although the average number of *members* attending remains approximately the same as last year at 20 per talk.

Fund raising

The Kettering Grammar school foundation again gave a grant towards the museum children's activities which will help us in our efforts to encourage children to attend the workshops. The number of youth members taking advantage of the free places is steadily increasing: 2015: 127; 2016: 140; 2018: 173. With the increase in membership, we are hoping it will continue next year.

This year, we ran a fund raising stall at the Women's Cycle Race, distributing Highlights and raising money for the children's activities with *spin a wheel* for youngsters. This and the Christmas charity market stall were well supported by members, despite, for both events, the weather was not at all encouraging to visitors.

Everyone who helped to set up and run the pop up museum and gallery stalls on the market place on three Fridays during the Summer, worked really hard to engage as many as possible, including several artists who gave their time to do demonstrations. We were learning as we went and received very good feedback and ideas from members and the public.



We were able to take the coop exhibition to All Saints art exhibition and the Carnival to further promote the idea. We intend to scale down the exhibition and to take it to care homes and schools and other community events this year. Watch this space!

We continued to help with the distribution of the 'What's On' magazine and where possible display posters and encourage use of social media. Help is always appreciated in any advertising of events and the Friends.

We have again supported the 'Fill this space' Youth competition with prizes for all categories and were impressed by the standard of work.

The Friends supported the Alfred East Gallery 2017 Open Art Exhibition in April/May. A new format, just for this year, entitled 'Fill this Space.' Open to all local artists - who were invited to

submit up to two works. There was no selection committee, all works were hung. This resulted in a large number of new artists taking part but it was not supported by many previous Open artists (who were unhappy with the format). The final exhibition when hung was considered varied and colourful. The Youth section was supported with prizes from the Friends, and though small, was of a very high standard.

During the Summer Katie Boyce, the AEG Gallery Officer, after 5 years at the Gallery, moved on to further her career at Rugby Art Gallery. The Friends worked very closely with Katie on many projects both exhibitions and conservation. The

Friends look forward to working with her successor Billie Stephenson.

In September the Friends finally succeeded in getting the George Frampton bronze bust of Sir Alfred East scanned in a 3d format. Through an introduction set up by Katie Boyce, Lincoln Conservation took on the task observed by several members of the Committee. The scan is now archived with KBC who kindly agreed to foot the bill. Monies had been donated by Paul and Guy Johnson towards the cost, this will be now used on future related AE projects.

In the Autumn 'Alfred East-The Incidental Etcher' was published by KBC with financial support from KBC, the Friends and KDAS. After three years of research and with encouragement from Katie Boyce the book was launched alongside a supporting exhibition of the Gallery's collection of East etchings along with loans of other rare related works. This was the largest, most complete, showing of East's etchings for many years and was enjoyed by many visitors. The book is in the Gallery shop plus Amazon and EBay.

Phil Steele (Website and Social Media) reminds us all to click on Facebook and like and share the stories and images about the Museum, Gallery and the Friends ... this really helps as regular activity boosts our messages and increases the effectiveness of our publicity. It is free and it works well for us as an organisation.

Museum and Gallery Report April 2017-March 2018

With financial assistance from the Friends (and other grant funders) we were successful in purchasing East's The Overgrown Garden. The piece has been displayed twice, firstly in the re-hang of the award winning Collection Connections exhibition and in the RA 250 show. Without the Friend's valuable financial and moral support we wouldn't have been able to secure the funding. The piece is a significant departure East's usual artistic style.

In June Katie Boyce left us to become Rugby's Art Gallery and Museum Senior Arts Officer. During her 5 years with us, Katie revolutionised the gallery's programme, and project managed the hugely successful Northamptonshire Open Studies events. We are delighted that Katie will be returning to the gallery in April to help judge this year's Kettering Open.

In September Billie was successful in securing a year's placement as the Gallery Officer. Billie has certainly hit the ground running! Curating the *RA250* show and, with the assistance of Ian Luck, *The Incidental Etcher* exhibition. Billie and Adam Wallis (Gallery Assistant) have delivered a very successful programme of film nights, which is drawing in new visitors to the gallery.

At the Museum we received funding from the Arts Council to refurbish one of the temporary exhibition rooms to government insurance standards, and to create a Community Space. The new *Community Space* came into its own when we had over 900 visits for the *Fairies and Folklore Day* in February! We have also secured funding from the Art Fund to support a local archaeological treasures exhibition in the refurbished exhibition space. The exhibition will open in September 2018. The continued support from the Friends for our craft activities at the Museum is highly appreciated and is an essential offer for our family visitors.

The Friends' support for our activities is invaluable, and particularly this year in helping to launch the *Pop Up Museum*. The Friends have taken the Pop Up Museum to many events and activities which helps to publicise to our local communities how fantastic the Gallery and Museum are.

We have continued to deliver a staggering array of exhibitions, events and workshops. At the Museum the Co-op exhibition was expertly curated by Karen Adhemar. The exhibition was extremely well received by visitors. The Friends help at the Co Op *tea and biscuits* event was invaluable.

As we head into the Summer, we look forward to liaising closely with the Friends, and for your continued and valuable support.
